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Cinema & Território. International journal of art and image's anthropology

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Format: in electronic version - RTF file (Microsoft Word).

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Idioms: Portuguese, Spanish, French or English (if in another language, please contact the editorial board).

Paper: between 8.000 and 10.000 words - single line spacing - footnotes, bibliography and abstracts included.

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Critical review: critique of publications or audiovisual and other interdisciplinary productions, in which cinema is present, should not exceed 6,000 words - single spaced - including notes, bibliography and abstracts.

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- Paper's title: TNR 14PT, centred at the top of the page, bold.
- **Identification:** right-aligned, TNR 12, normal: Name(s) of the author(s); Functions Scientific Affiliation and/or institutional link of the author(s); E-mail address in this preferential order: University/Faculty/Research Centre where you are integrated/contact e-mail. No additional information may be placed in the header or footer.

Abstracts: TNR 12, single line spacing, justified

Two (2) abstracts, of a maximum of 200 words each, one in the language of the paper and one in English. If the language of the paper is already in English, the second should be in one of the languages of the review.

<u>Keywords</u>: 6 words maximum, lowercase (except for proper names) and between commas, TNR 12, normal

Body of the text: TNR 12, single line spacing, justified.

- First line: 0.5 cm
- Automatic margins are of 3 cm (top and bottom) and 2,5 cm (left and right).
- Title and subtitles of the article should follow the levels of APA Style, 7th edition (p. 48).
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Quotations

- Under 40 words: must appear in inverted commas without italics in the body of the text. The English quotation marks/double inverted commas "text" (without spaces which cannot be broken) are also used to highlight a term/word or differentiate dialogues in narrative texts/quotations. All quotations must be accompanied by the bibliographic reference, as in the following example: (Malinowski, 1927, p. 73) or Malinowski (1927, p. 73).
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Recommended abbreviations (without italics):

• op. cit. [opere citato, work cited] when it is the same bibliographic reference (same date as the edition consulted), (Malinowski, op. cit., p.79);

- ibid. (ibidem, in the same place), identical date and page, (Malinowski, ibid.);
- et al. (meaning "and others") if there are several authors, after first citing the complete reference (Malinowski, Rouch & Lévi-Strauss, 1980, p. 5), place only the name of the first author followed by et al. (Malinowski et al., 1980, p.5).

References: between different parts of the text should preferably be avoided. When existing should refer to the page number referred.

<u>Titles</u> of movies, books, newspapers, magazines, songs, plays, paintings, and related works: italics without quotation marks.

Foreign words: italic without quotation marks.

Extratexts: maps, drawings, paintings, tables, photographs, or others.

- They should be integrated in the text, sequentially numbered, identified as Figure or Table in bold (Figure 1/Table 1) in the upper corner of the Figure/Table, and be accompanied by a title (in normal italics) and, if necessary, a note/source in the lower corner of the image (name of the author/artist, if not identifiable, place a footnote with a possible link).
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Reference bibliography

With the title References, in bold, centred, all works cited or referenced in the text, and only those, should appear at the end of the article, in alphabetical order, according to the American Psychological Association, 7th Edition (APA) referencing rules.

- The first line of the reference: no special advance.
- From the 2nd line on: 0.5 cm indentation.
- Titles of works should appear in increasing sequence (from oldest to most recent); if there is more than one work by the same author and of the same year, these should be separated by assigning a letter, in alphabetical order (e.g. Cabral 1991a, Cabral 1991b, Cabral 1991c).

Book:

Surname, C. (year). *Book title*. Name of the editor. DOI (if any).

Ex: Augé, M. (2012). Non-places. Introduction to an anthropology of overmodernity. Letra Livre.

Part of a book/book chapter:

Surname, C. (year). Title of the chapter. Followed by Name of the editor or director (Ed. or Dir.). *Title of the book* (page numbers of the chapter). Name of the editor.

Ex: Rouch, J. (1979). La caméra et les hommes. In C. de France (Dir.). *Pour une anthropologie visuelle* (pp.53-72). Mouton Éditeur et École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales.

Article:

Surname, Initial(s) of first name. (year). Title of the article. *Title of the Journal*, volume (number), pages.

E.g.: Riley, R., Baker, D. & Van Doren, C. (1998). Movie Induced Tourism. *Annals of Tourism Research*, 25(4), 919-935.

Filmography and broadcasts:

All films cited or referenced in the text should be compiled at the end of the article.

E.g.: Hall, A. (Producer). (2014, May 1). *Sane in insane places* [Radio programme]. BBC Radio 4.

E.g.: Fry, H. (Writer), & Gale, C. (Director). (2018, August, 28). *The joy of winning* [Television programme]. Wingspan Productions.

E.g.: Gluck, D. H. (Director). (1979). *Deeper into hypnosis* [Film]. Englewood Cliffs.

Music CD:

E.g.: Metallica. (1986). Master of puppets [Album]. Asylum Records.

E.g.: Bowie, D. (2016). Blackstar [Album]. Columbia.

Webgraphy:

Same principles as above apply, followed by the website address or DOI without the hyperlink activated.

E.g.: Varennes, F. de (2003). Strangers in Foreign Lands: Diversity, Vulnerability and the Rights of Migrants, *MOST Discussion Paper*. Paris: UNESCO. http://www.unesco.org/most/paper_devarennes.pdf

NOTE: Despite the different forms/types, the final reference list is unique. In case of doubt, the author should consult the APA manual 7th edition.
